### Student sporting success:

Great to see students experiencing success both within and beyond the school. Elsewhere in this publication are the results of the Interschool Snowsports competition, for which MSC finished 9th. A range of great individual results contributed to this outcome.

The National Snowsports competition is held at Perisher this year. This competition is not run as a school event and parents are expected to accompany their child/ren to the competition. We wish them all the best to those attending and competing.

In terms of cycling, we recognise both Elise Empey (6th in the UCI MTB World Championships for Junior Women Downhill racing) and Ruby Dobson (50th in the UCI MTB World Championships for Junior Women Cross Country Olympic racing). Both students are returning to school this week following time overseas racing.

Molly Lines has also been successful in Eventing with her horse Tadpole, winning the 3-star event last weekend. Well done Molly!

My reflection is on the capabilities of our students, both within and beyond the school and academic success. We have a range of students competing in very high-end sport, whilst balancing work and school commitments. Our youth are extraordinary!

### Parent survey:

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents/guardians think of our school. The Parent/Guardian Opinion Survey is an annual survey conducted by the Department of Education and Training that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement.

We encourage all families to participate in this survey. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

Previously, a random sample of parents/guardians have been selected to participate, this year, all families are invited to participate. The link is open until Friday 16th September.

The survey will be conducted online, only takes 20 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the fieldwork period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

Survey results are reported to School Council. Last year we used the survey outcomes to plan for an improved student wellbeing program (The Resilience Project) and to structure improved school communication strategies (particularly the shift from 'Xuno' to 'Compass'). ### General Achievement Test (GAT):

The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) exams are just around the corner. As part of the assessment process, run by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority, all students engaging in a Year 12 VCE Unit will complete the GAT next week on Wednesday 7th September.

The GAT is a test of general knowledge and skills including communication, mathematics, science and technology, the arts, humanities and social sciences taken by students in the course of completing their senior secondary studies. The results are important for a range of reasons:

- they provide a 'backup' in the case where a student cannot participate in the end of year exam due to injury or illness. The GAT is used as part of a process to develop a 'derived exam score' for the missed assessment
- they provide a reference point for student learning progress. Where student exam results are inconsistent with the GAT result, extra care is taken in the assessment process including, for example, extra examiners marking the exam.

### Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) examiners:

Our school actively encourages VCE teachers to work as exam markers for the VCE exams. It is an important service that they offer to education generally, and is a great way to ensure that the VCE students in their classes have up-to-date tips in maximising exam results. We have a range of staff involved. This is not common across all schools and shows the dedication of our team. I am proud of the lengths they go to, for the benefit of our students.

## Victorian Senior School Reform

From 2023, senior secondary education in Victoria is changing. The changes are being made due to the review into vocational and applied learning (VCAL). At Mansfield Secondary College, VCAL will no longer be a program option for students beginning Year 11 from 2023 onwards.

The Department of Education states "From 2023 there'll be two ways to obtain your Victorian Certificate of Education. You can enrol in VCE or the VCE Vocational Major, a new two-year vocational, applied learning program within the VCE. It replaces and builds on the strengths of Intermediate and Senior VCAL. There will also be the Victorian Pathways Certificate, replacing Foundation VCAL, for students who may not be ready or able to complete a certificate at VCE level. Whether you want to take on university, TAFE, an apprenticeship or traineeship, or head straight into the workforce when you finish school, there is a secondary pathway that will help get you there."

### Certificate options



#### Victorian Certificate of Education

The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) will continue to be delivered in the same way it always has, with the requirements remaining the same in 2023. VCE is a two-year senior secondary certificate. It is a scored pathway, resulting in study scores and an ATAR, which enables students to pursue tertiary education, higher level TAFE or VET certificate courses, apprenticeships, traineeships, and the workforce.

#### VCE Vocational Major

The VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) is a new two-year non-scored vocational and applied learning program that is placed directly within the VCE. It is designed to equip students with the essential skills for work, further education, and student personal pursuits as an active and engaged member of society. The VCE VM is a good option for students who like to learn in a real world, work environment and for those who do not need an ATAR for their post school pathway. Students do not gain an ATAR when completing the VCE VM, and as such, there are no external exams associated with this program, however, all students do need to undertake the General Achievement Test (GAT).

#### Victorian Pathways Certificate

The Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) is a new certificate designed for students who may not be able or ready to complete a certificate at VCE level and need more flexibility in learning. The coursework is designed and delivered at a more accessible level than the VCE and VCE VM. If a student would like to enrol in the VPC, this will be discussed with the Senior School Coordinator, family, and the student to determine suitability and an individualised program.

### Each pathway builds on the learning strengths and aspirations of the student

Mansfield Secondary College will be implementing a default program for the VCE VM to ensure the best opportunity of successful completion for all students. Students do have the option of completing VCE subjects as part of the VCE VM, within the availability of the timetable, but limited by eligibility requirements. For students enrolled in the VPC, an individualised program will be created, and students will attend respective classes with the VCE VM students in the relevant year level. The default program for all students selecting the VCE VM is outlined below.

## The GAT - General Achievement Test

The GAT is taking place on the 7th September 2022, this year all Unit 3 & 4 students will undertake the GAT.

From 2023 VCE and VCE VM students will undertake the GAT.

### GENERAL ACHIEVEMENT TEST (GAT) 2022 INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS

#### GENERAL ACHIEVEMENT TEST (GAT) 2022 INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS

The General Achievement Test (GAT) assesses skills in mathematics, science, technology, the arts and humanities.

The GAT will also assess your skills against new literacy and numeracy standards introduced this year.

Sitting the GAT is an opportunity to demonstrate your literacy and numeracy skills – essential skills that show you're ready to move on to further study, training or employment. It will give you confidence that your skills are at the right level to support you, whatever you choose to do after school.

GAT results are also important for checking that VCE external assessments and school-based assessments have been accurately and fairly assessed and can be used if you have a Derived Examination Score (DES) approved.

The GAT will take place on **Wednesday 7 September** in two parts:

- **Section A** assesses skills in literacy (reading and writing) and numeracy.
- **Section B** assesses general knowledge and skills in mathematics, science, technology, the arts and humanities.

#### Section A: Literacy and Numeracy (2 hours + 15 minutes reading time) – 9:30am – 11:45am

#### Who is required to sit the GAT?

- If you're enrolled in one or more VCE, or scored VCE VET Unit 3-4 sequence, you are expected to complete Section A and B of the GAT.
- If you are enrolled in Senior VCAL, you're expected to complete Section A only, unless you are also enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3-4 sequence.
- If you're an International Baccalaureate student in your final year of studies and you want a notional Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) calculated, you will need to complete Section A and B.

#### What to bring

You may take an English and/or bilingual printed dictionary into both sections of the GAT, but not a thesaurus or a combined thesaurus-dictionary. Electronic dictionaries are not permitted.

A scientific calculator is permitted in both sections of the GAT. You will need pens, pencils and an eraser to complete the GAT.

#### Do I need to study for the GAT?

You don't need to do any special study for the GAT. Questions are based on things you will have already learnt throughout school and things you may have experienced in life. For example, a writing question might ask you to draft a letter to an employer; and a numeracy question might assess your ability to understand your hourly pay rate.

#### Support and Special Examination Arrangements

If you have an illness, injury or disability you can apply for Special Examination Arrangements such as rest breaks or extra working time to help you do the GAT. Talk to your school who can apply to the VCAA on your behalf.

If reasonable or appropriate arrangements can't be made or you miss the GAT because of an unexpected injury, illness, personal trauma or other serious event, the VCAA may give you an exemption. Your school can ask for an exemption on your behalf.

#### Getting your results

In December you'll receive a GAT Statement of Results as part of your overall results package which will indicate whether you have met the literacy and numeracy standards.

If you don't meet the literacy and numeracy standards in 2022, you can resit the GAT in 2023.

### Tips for completing the GAT

Read all information carefully.

Follow the rules for sitting the GAT. You can read the rules in this document or online at [vcaa.vic.edu.au/GAT](http://vcaa.vic.edu.au/GAT)

Complete the tasks in the order they appear in the question book.

It is important you attempt all sections of the GAT. Even if you do not complete a section in the time allocated, you should move onto the next section when indicated during the test.

Try to pick out the key ideas and information in each question.

For multiple-choice questions, try to quickly reject choices that appear to be wrong, then read the question again, and select the answer most likely to be right. You won't lose marks for incorrect answers.





## Health & First Aid Ambulance Visit

## Student Attendance

As indicated in the College's previous two "attendance" letters, we are working to improve student outcomes through the reduction of absences across all year levels. The Department of Education and Training are supporting this through the "Every Day Counts" program. We would encourage you to talk with your child to discuss the importance of consistent school attendance by referring to important facts outlined below.

When students stay away from school, their learning and friendships are affected. There are many practical issues associated with absenteeism.

Students who are absent from school:

- miss the introduction of new work
- fail to complete work
- miss revision time
- miss homework explanation
- fall behind with their learning
- develop disjointed home-reading routines
- develop inconsistent homework returns/routines
- may lack confidence and feel embarrassed because they cannot do work the class has been studying
- feel left out from class discussion when they have missed a special class activity and cannot do the associated work
- miss specialist lessons because these lessons only occur once a week and so, for example, artwork is not completed or is rushed to finish in the limited time available
- miss notices and newsletters to take home
- miss celebrations, for example excursions, visitors, assemblies, and special activities
- can find it difficult to break into established friendship groups and develop good friendships with their peers
- can develop a poor attitude towards school, believing 'I won't miss much if I'm not at school'
- fail to realise that the teachers and students miss them.

Sometimes students stay at home for reasons that are not acceptable, for example:

- the child's birthday
- too tired to come to school because of a late night
- staying home with a sibling or parent who is sick
- staying away for the whole day when an appointment is booked for a short time in the morning or afternoon
- weather conditions, for example too hot or too wet.

Please remember that if you are experiencing difficulty in having your child attend school, discuss the matter with their Year Level Coordinator.

## Vaping

Vaping is the inhaling of a vapour created by an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette).

An e-cigarette is a device that simulates tobacco smoking. It consists of an atomizer, a power source such as a battery, and a container such as a cartridge or tank. Instead of smoke, the user inhales vapour. The liquid that fills the cartridge often contains nicotine (which is extracted from tobacco), propylene glycol, flavourings and other chemicals.

Some people start vaping as an alternative to cigarette smoking (often as a way to quit), however, others choose to vape and become addicted to the nicotine in the vaping liquid, then transition to cigarette smoking.

Many young people experiment with vaping and quitting can be difficult. It's important that correct information is provided, and support is available, because reducing or completely giving up something that your body enjoys is difficult.

Parents and family members play an important role in helping a young person to reduce or stop vaping. Here are some strategies that can be helpful:

Tips that may help a young person to quit:

1. The 4 D's: Delay, Drink water, Deep breathe, Do something else
2. Be active as a distraction from vaping
3. Get together with a friend to quit
4. Throw e-cigarettes away
5. Do something that is fun with a friend who doesn't vape
6. Change routine, eg try eating lunch in a different place or with different people
7. Save vape money to spend on something else
8. Find new ways to cope with stress or anger, eg. talk to a friend, exercise
9. Keep hands busy, eg. drawing, paint fingernails
10. Make 'No more vaping' reminder cards to leave in a wallet, bag or bedroom

Conditions of Entry

- Welcome:** Arts Mansfield is proud to present this popular event – now in its twenty sixth year. 'Median to Rare' is a one-day-only outdoor sculpture competition which will be held on the Median Strip opposite the Mansfield Post Office on October 29, 2022 commencing at 8.30am.
- The competition:** the competition is open to adults, youth and students.
- The theme:** "Anything goes. Anyone can participate."
- Judging:** judging is conducted by a free public ballot conducted on the day of the exhibition.
- Prizes:** Three non-acquisitive prizes will be awarded :- this will depend on the number of participants. We will need to negotiate prize monies if participant numbers are considerably reduced. Adult section – First Prize \$2000, Second prize \$1000, Youth section – First prize \$200.
- Number of entries:** Each artist may enter up to five works.
- Entry form:** download an entry form from the Arts Mansfield website [artsmansfield.com.au](http://artsmansfield.com.au) Complete, sign and return the form by mail with payment details to ACM, PO Box 34, Mansfield, Vic 3724 or email to [suehare7@gmail.com](mailto:suehare7@gmail.com) by Friday, October 21, 2022. **Entries by negotiation after this date**
- Entrants will be advised by email of the receipt of their entry form and payment.
- Entry fee:** for each work entered, artists pay an entry fee of **AU\$20** (non-members of AM), or **AU\$15** (members AM). In the event of a COVID lockdown all entry fees will be fully refunded. A membership form can be found on the Arts Mansfield website [artsmansfield.com.au](http://artsmansfield.com.au).
- Reproduction of artwork:** completion and signing of the Arts Mansfield Median to Rare October 29, 2022 Entry Form will be taken to indicate that an artist agrees to allow photographs of their work to be used without fee on the AM website and for Median to Rare 2022 media, advertising or publicity purposes.
- Provenance:** entries must be the original work of the artist, completed within the past two 2 years and not previously exhibited in the Mansfield district. To avoid confusion with multiple entries all work must have the title of the artwork and the artist's name attached.
- Delivery of works:** entered works should be delivered to the Median Strip opposite the Post Office and set up between 8 and 9am on Saturday, October 29, 2022.
- Damage or loss:** Arts Mansfield will take due care of entries but will not be responsible for damage to or the loss or breakage of any work while in transit or on exhibition. It is recommended that artists insure their own work.
- Public Liability Insurance:** Arts Mansfield will not be responsible for public liability associated with entries in transit on exhibition. It is recommended that artists also have their own Artist Public Liability Insurance.
- Sales:** apart from student entries, all works entered should be available for sale on the day. Prices indicated on the entry form should be inclusive of GST. Arts Mansfield expects that prices should provide a fair return for the artist but not be prohibitive for art collectors.
- Commission on sales:** commission will be charged on all works sold at the rate of 20% of the price indicated on the entry form.
- Prize money:** The Median to Rare October 2022 prize money will be inclusive of GST.
- Awarding of prizes:** a prize may not be awarded if there are insufficient entries in the Median to Rare October 2022 competition or the judges consider the standard of work entered is inadequate.
- Announcement of winners:** winners will be announced at the Median to Rare exhibition area between 3.30 and 4pm.
- Payment of the prize:** unless they are in attendance at the announcement of winners, the winning artists will be advised by telephone or email and a cheque for the prize money will be forwarded to the address provided on their entry form within 2 weeks of the exhibition closing. Alternatively, a bank transfer will take place.
- Pick up of works:** artists are asked to collect their work from the Median Strip between 4pm and 4.30pm on and Saturday, October 29, 2022. Uncollected works may be subject to handling and storage charges and, following reasonable efforts by Arts Mansfield to return the work, eventual sale.
- Payment for sales:** when works are sold, cheques for the sale amount or transfer to bank account, less commission, will be forwarded to the artist at the address/bank account provided on their entry form within 30 days of the exhibition closing.

- Changes to these conditions:** in the event that these Conditions of Entry are changed, every reasonable effort will be made to advise artists.
